March 16 was our Professional Development day for staff. Our staff continued our work with English Language Arts Consultant Dr. Lisa Rivard. We examined balanced literacy and the essential elements. Then, in the afternoon, we all worked together as a team to explore our mathematics curriculum, Eureka Math (Engage New York). It was a productive day for our team!

We have had instances of students sharing this information. 

In math they are working on 3-digit multiplication. It involves a lot of thinking and they are all working hard and doing great!


The students have also moved ahead in reading.


How to Catch a leprechaun
