

Macomb Intermediate School District Instructional Technology Distance Learning Department is proud to offer free distance learning programs for the 2023 – 2024 school year.

Welcome back to a new school year. Please read the introduction for clarification about registering for a program, dates and times of this year's ASK and Interactive Programs.

The **ASK** programs are for students to read a particular book, journaling their responses to what they have read and prepare in-depth questions for the author/specialist for the distance learning program. An ASK session is designed for one classroom of students. We will be connecting a maximum of 2 - 3 classes per session/hour. Each session is 1 hour long.

The **Interactive programs** are spontaneous programs. No questions are required to prepare. Interactive programs are an engaging and hands-on in which the student will learn as we go during the distance learning program. Books are not included but only the hands-on materials that will help the teacher prepare the students for the activities that will be done during the program. The programs are scheduled like the ASK programs with sessions that are designed for 2-3 classrooms per session for one hour.

There will be a Q & A session during or at the end of an interactive program to see if students have questions about what they are learning. **IF** the teacher covers the subject with the students prior to the program then questions can be prepared for the program but there probably will not be enough time for all the student's questions to be asked or answered.

Important Tidbits:

Check your school's calendar prior to registering for any distance learning program!

Each teacher will need to complete their own individual registration so that they will receive the emails from me and that the materials are shipped directly to them and that we know who will exactly be participating in the program. I will not send duplicate containers of materials to teachers that are registered for several times for one programs.

Teachers will receive a container of materials. The container will include 25 – 30 chapter books and anywhere from 1-10 picture books (for group reading). A teacher supplement notebook will be included with information about the author or educational specialist, journaling and miscellaneous writing prompts, miscellaneous lesson, activities, and background information about the subject of the book. Sometimes a DVD or a poster may be included in the container of materials in which will be sent to you about 7 weeks prior to the date of the distance learning program.

You the teacher / educator will decide if you want your students to participate in the distance learning programs. There are a limited number of teachers that can participate in them so it will be on a first come first serve basis. After you register for a program, you will receive an email from "misdDL@misd.net" that will let you know what your status is for that program. Please read your email **carefully** about your status for that program.

These distance learning programs are through the Zoom meeting software program only. Once you register for the program you will receive the Zoom meeting connection information about a week prior to the date of the distance learning program. At the end of this schedule is the Zoom Video Conference Guidelines.

The distance learning programs that are offered to you through the Macomb Intermediate School District are free to you, but they are not free for the MISD. The MISD does pay a fee to our authors and specialists along with purchasing the materials. Therefore, cancellation after the materials have been shipped to you will result with your name being put on a “naughty list”.

In order to avoid this, you will be notified with a **"reminder" e-mail** before the materials are to be shipped with withdrawal instructions and a deadline date to withdraw from the program. If I don't hear from you by the withdrawal date, I assume you are participating in the program and the materials will be shipped to you. It is important to note that we very much want your participation. We usually have a waiting list for these programs so others can participate if you cannot.

A lot of time and energy goes into preparing the schedule with the authors/specialists, preparing materials, and shipping materials for a lot of different distance learning programs for the school year not to mention moderating the programs on the date of the program. So please respect my time and energy in not using these programs just to register for a program then not participate in it just to get a classroom set of books. And please keep track of your materials and ship them back to me in a timely manner. Again, a lot of money, time and energy is put into the containers of materials and there are only enough containers for each program offered.

You must use you school e-mail if you wish to participate in this program. We use e-mail to confirm your participation, send reminders, and send Zoom connection information and to contact you with any updates or changes with the programs.

Your technology department in your school district is included in the emails that you receive. It is up to you and your technology department to contact each other to make sure the Zoom meeting can work in your classroom and to avoid any glitches on the day of the program.

1. Using Zoom through the MISD is safe and secure! Brian Boudreau knows all the tweaks it takes to have a secure meeting. We use passcodes that are needed to login to the Zoom meeting. Brian and I both moderate the program to insure the program goes smoothly. We expect the student's to use proper etiquette during the program. If we see a student that has inappropriate behavior we will immediately put that student in the waiting room as sort of a "time out" or disconnect that student. Behind the scenes Brian and I have the control with microphones and participants which helps to keep the meeting running smoothly for all to enjoy.
2. There has been a lot of discussions about using Zoom from the homes. All we can do is forward the information to you, the teacher to forward to the students. We sincerely hope that the parents use discretion and help guide the students into using Zoom for educational purposes. We also request that the students do not share the meeting ID # or the passcode to anyone else for security purposes.
3. Teachers that register for the program need to be in the Zoom meeting as well. The program will run just like a regular program as if in a classroom setting. I will moderate the program and call on the teacher to have 3 of her/his students to ask questions at a time. 3 questions per round of questions per rotation.
4. We ask that the teachers have a student count for us and also help monitor their students' behavior while in the Zoom meeting.
5. We ask that students use their first and last name so the teacher will know who they are and that there are no "silly" names being used.
6. The students will be put into the Zoom waiting room until all the teachers and the presenter are connected in the meeting.

7. As always we try to give every student a chance to be heard. If the program tends to fade out early then we can end the program early. The presenter is prepared for this. But the many talks I've had with the authors and specialists is that they can interact, have writing or drawing activities and start a discussion among students to keep them engaged.
8. If you have a Zoom account and login to participate then all you need is the meeting ID# to join the meeting. But if you just click on the link for the Zoom meeting then you will need the meeting ID# and the passcode. Also Google Chrome is used for Zoom, Internet Explorer does not work with Zoom.
