model at Center Line High School has only been in place a few years, but graduates are already seeing dividends of the program as they further their education and find their way into the workforce.

Christina Khoshaba, a 2019 CLHS graduate, took the Emergency Medical Technician course that is part of the Health and Human Services Academy, and now works as a licensed EMT as she works toward a degree in the medical field.

"I always knew I wanted to be a doctor. When I was in high school I wanted to take classes that might help me understand the medical field better," Khoshaba said. "I didn't expect to fully get the license, but I really enjoyed the class a lot so I did get the license. Now I'm going to use it as a stepping stone for my future career.'

Class of 2020 grad Gordon Armstrong had a similar experience as he completed the EMT course and passed the National Registry exam. Armstrong is now in the pre-med program at Michigan State University, and hopes to work his way through school as an EMT.

"The CTE class helped prepare me for college" Armstrong said. "The structure of the class felt like a college course. It really helped introduce me to what college courses were going to be like. I definitely credit how well I did my first semester of college to that course.

Max Stricker, an undergrad pre-med student at Baylor University from the Class of 2018 also completed the EMT course and credits it for finding his way into the medical field as he also works as an EMT when not in school.


