## Center Line High School Academies Spark Interest in Careers

The academy model at Center Line High School is putting students on the path to careers by supplementing classroom instruction with experiences in the field. Center Line students enroll in either the Academy of Health and Human Services (HHS) or the Academy of Industry, Technology, and Innovation (ITI). Both academies offer numerous opportunities for field trips that allow students exposure to on-the-job experiences and interaction with professionals.

This year, teaming with Fraser and Armada Schools, Center Line was one of very few districts in Michigan to be awarded a competitive Marshall Plan Innovation Grant. As part of that grant, Center Line has partnered with Ford's Next Generation Learning (NGL) to become a full NGL Community which supports all students in all grades.

The NGL team met with all stakeholder groups over the course of two days to get feedback to create a clear picture of the schools. They met with business partners, students, parents, teachers, and administrators, from all around the district. They will use those results to create a plan to take the district where it wants to go. Center Line is already well on the way to addressing the problems of the skilled-trades gap through the academies. With Ford NGL's assistance, the district hopes level.
